The Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan (2013)¹ identifies two safeguarded sites within Gosport Borough, one of which is a household waste recycling centre.

Household waste

The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) collects statistics to show the amount of residual household waste collected in each local authority. Residual waste is any collected household waste that is not reused, recycled or composted.

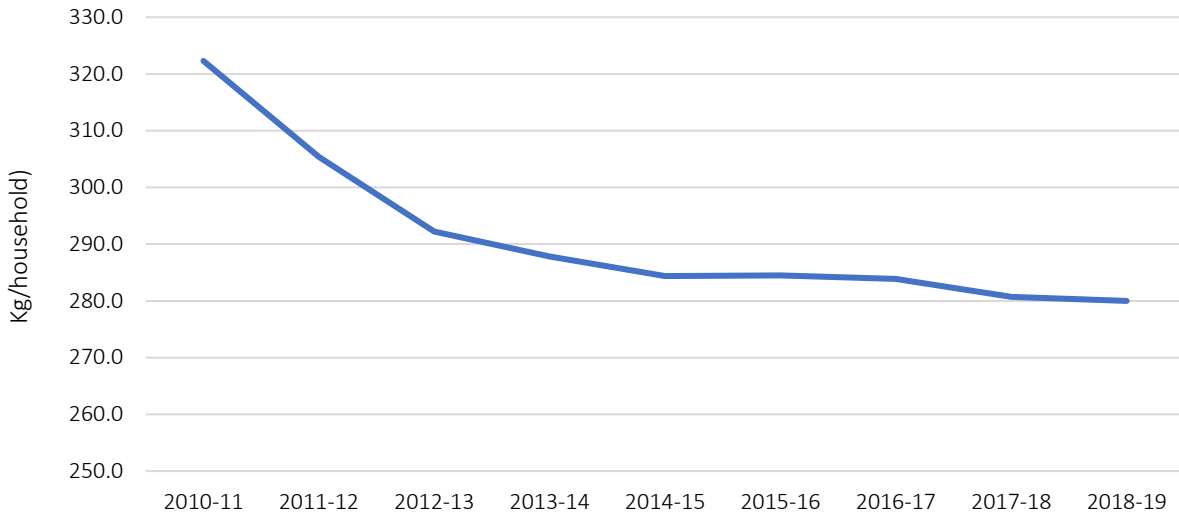


Figure 14.2: Household Waste per Person (Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs)

Since 2010/11, the amount of household waste generated in England and the South East has gradually declined and the amount recycled has increased. Gosport has followed a similar trend with household waste per person reducing from 322.3 kg in 2010/11 to 280 kg in 2018/19. The amount of waste collected per person is shown in Figure 14.2.

Collected household waste per person (kg) in Gosport Borough

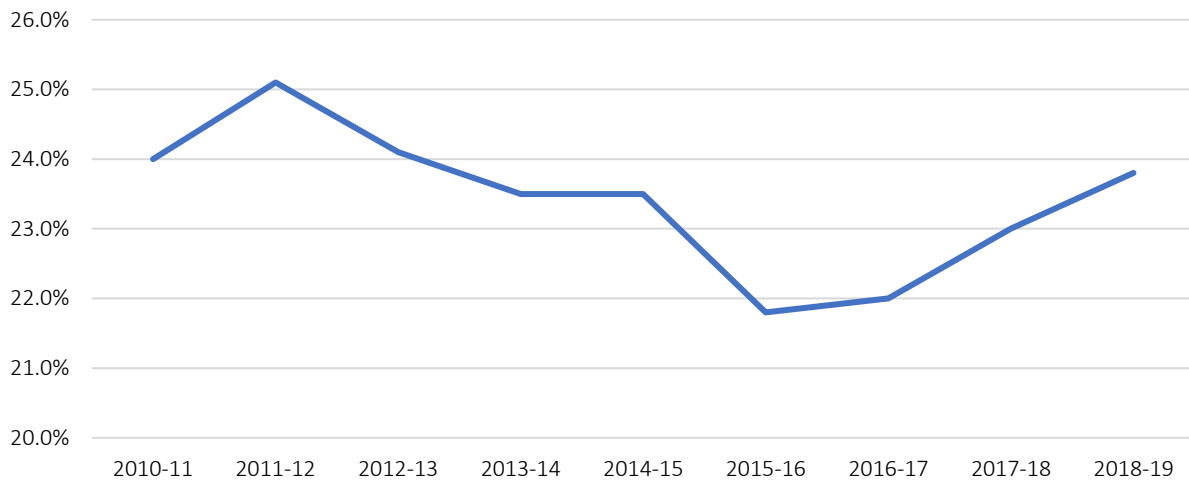


Figure 14.3: Percentage of household waste reused, recycled or composted (DEFRA, 2019)

In 2010/11, 24% of Gosport Borough’s waste was sent for reuse, recycling or composting. This has fluctuated slightly, between a high of 25.1% and a low of 21.8% (Figure 14.3 below).

As of 2018/19, the percentage of household waste sent for reuse, recycling or composting stands at 23.8%.

Percentage of household waste sent for reuse, recycling or composting in Gosport Borough

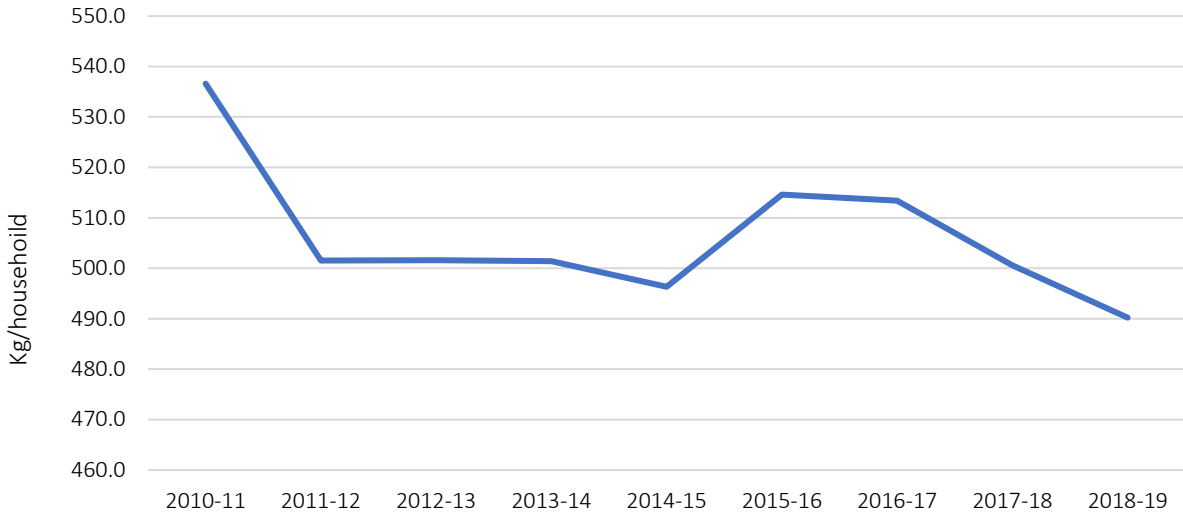


Figure 14.4: Residual household waste (DEFRA, 2019)

The residual household waste per household (kg/household) has seen a reasonably steady reduction since 2010. In 2010 each household produced 536.6kg of residual waste, this has reduced to 490.2 kg in 2018/19. The trend is shown in Figure 14.4.

Residual household waste per household (kg/household) in Gosport Borough

Fly tipping incidents

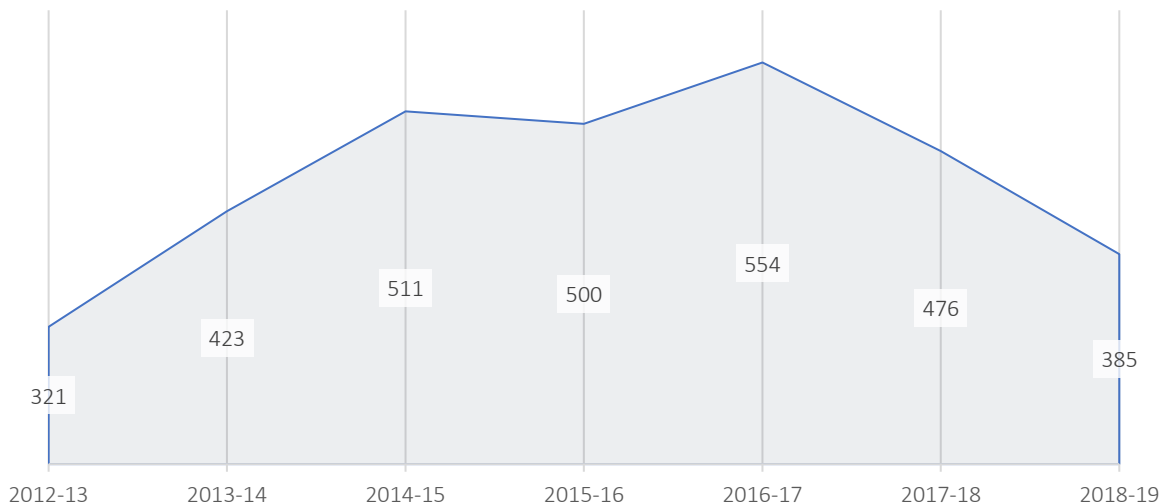


Figure 14.5: Total fly tipping incidences reported by local authority (Gosport Borough) (DEFRA 2019)

Data from DEFRA ([WasteDataFlow](#)) shows that there were 385 reported fly tipping incidents in Gosport Borough in 2018/19. This is down from a peak of 554 in 2016/17 although is higher than 321 incidents in 2012/13. The total number of reported fly tipping incidences is shown in Figure 14.5.

Gosport Borough: Total fly-tipping incidences reported by local authority
