Helping Royal Clarence Yard achieve its commercial potential



Commercial success will still be a long time coming



A major problem has always been lack of footfall



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Many useful ideas have been floated for temporary use of the currently vacant commercial units but what is needed is a long-lasting attraction that can act as a magnet for visitors, stimulate retail footfall and become the nucleus for other activity taking place on the waterfront



HMS SULTAN

The Airfield Museum gives the history of the surrounding area used as an airfield from 1909-1956. Learn about the world's first "Top Gun" establishment 1917-19, and how the 'Gosport' method of flying training was adopted by the world.

The Marine Engineering Museum gives the history of marine engineering in the RN and displays a collection of records, artefacts and memorabilia covering marine engineering training in HMS Sultan, Fisgard and Caledonia from 1903 to present day.




HMS Collingwood

The HMS Collingwood museum features an extensive collection of Naval communications and radar equipment.



HMS Daedalus

The Daedalus Virtual Aviation Museum tells the story of naval aviation at Lee-on-Solent from the dark days of 1917 through to the present day. The Museum is a memorial to the men and women who served our country in times of peace and peril, and to the airfield which bore witness to the birth of naval aviation and development of the Fleet Air Arm and Royal Air Force in Britain and the Commonwealth.



HMS Dolphin

The Royal Navy Submarine Museum at Gosport traces the international history of submarine development from the age of Alexander the Great to the present day, and particularly the history of the Submarine Service from the tiny Holland 1 to the nuclearpowered Vanguard class submarine.



Royal Naval Medical Service

Historic library and collection, comprising books and other documents from the libraries and museums previously housed at the Royal Naval Hospitals Plymouth and Haslar, together with the Queen Alexandra's Royal Naval Nursing Service Museum and Archives



Explosion!

An award winning museum of naval warfare created within 18th century buildings at the Royal Navy's former armaments depot of Priddy's Hard, in Gosport, Hampshire.



HMS Hornet Trust

Our mission is preserving the history of the "the Spitfires of the Seas" the Royal Navy's Coastal Forces, who achieved remarkable success totally disproportionate to the numbers and size of the vessels.

HMS St Vincent

Trained 27,000 boys for the Royal Navy from 1927 to 1968. The boat currently dropping off at Explosion is small and the water too shallow for bigger craft.


A larger vessel could drop people at Royal Clarence Marina who can then visit the heritage centre en-route to and from Explosion.




